

WORLD DAY OF REMEMBRANCE

FOR ROAD TRAFFIC VICTIMS

Joined with all countries in the world on the 19th of November 2023 we commemorated again the World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims.

In 1993, at the initiative of Brigitte Chaudhry, founder of Road Peace, this celebration started in the UK and quickly spread to other victims' organizations under the auspices of the FEVR.

In October 2005, the UN officially declared the third Sunday of November the World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims, since then more and more national and international institutions support this day and they are taking the aim of "vision Zero", that means no more victims in traffic mobility.

During the last 30 years more than 50.000.000 of people have died and over 500.000.000 were injured. (according to estimates by the European Commission for each deceased person have been 4 people with brain or spinal cord injuries, 8 people with serious injuries and 50 people with several injuries.

- Member States should adapt 'Vision Zero' for **all** road users since each road death and injury is much more than just a number. These are real people and family tragedies.
- Don't call these deaths or serious injuries accidents: Crash not Accident

Let's honour on this day a memory for the victims and families suffering and commit ourselves to not allow this to further continue to occur. *(adapted from WdoR PR 2018, still true)*


Brigitte Chaudhry and Jeannot Mersch had written an E-Book about 30 Years of Remembrance (1993-2023)


